Daris Gibson Square Museum of Art (The Square) will host a Closing Reception and Artist Talk with Red Lodge artist, Maggy Rozycki Hiltner on Friday, April 11th from 5:30 - 7:30pm. The program is at 1400 1st Ave North, Great Falls, Montana and is free and open to the public. This is the last week for visitors to explore the exhibition. which has its last day on view April 12th. Visitors at the event will hear from the artist about her

artistic career and the artwork on view. A fullcolor brochure publication will also be available for visitors to take home.

Hiltner's lecture is titled "Whv So Serious?". "Humor is both an artistic and life strategy toward understanding relating to the world. A sense of humor that started off as schoolyard defense mechanism can end up as artistic empowerment. Some questions that to mind researching and writing this presentation were: Does art have to be serious to be taken seriously? Can humor be considered a universal historical phenomenon or do we project our own current tastes on predecessors? And what makes something funny? This presentation is a brief visual survey of humor in art that includes

BLOCK MANAGEMENT LANDOWNERS RECOGNIZED AT **FWP BANQUETS**

Block Management is a cooperative program between private landowners and Montana Fish, Wildlife & Parks that helps landowners manage 25 Year Award hunting activities and provides the Bermes Ranch - Broadview public with free hunting access to private land. Every year, FWP hosts banquets around the state to recognize the contributions that landowners in the Block Management Program make for the hunting community. This year in south-central Montana, banquets were held in Harlowton, Absarokee, Roundup and Billings.

their voluntary participation, landowners receive impact payments from FWP based on the number of hunters that visit their property in a season. FWP collaborates with each participating landowner to create unique and specific rules and maps for properties in the program. Landowners also receive a free hunting license combination and property signs and patrol by FWP staff. For many landowners, however, the true benefit of the Block Management Program is knowing their participation perpetuates Montana's hunting heritage.

During the 2024 hunting season, there were 106 Block Management Areas in FWP's Region 5 for a total of 501,093 enrolled acres. On those properties, there were 40,178 hunter days over the 2024 season.

COLONEL PAUL'S CORNER - A HIGHER CALL

Second Lieutenant Franz Stigler, a former airline pilot, had flown in combat since 1939 both in North Africa and after Germany's defeat there, in the skies over Europe. He had long since become an "Ace" with over 30 kills against allied aircraft. He flew the German Bf-109, a top line German fighter plane.

Second Lieutenant Charlie Brown, a B-17 pilot, was a farm boy from West Virginia. On 20 December, 1943 he would meet Franz Stigler, though he would not know the German's name till many years after the war ended.

Charlie left England as part of a fleet of B-17s assigned to the 379th Bomb Group stationed at Kimbolton. Three and a half hours later he had flown over the North Sea and entered Germany. The target was Bremen, where Germany had a factory producing Fw-190 fighter planes. The "Ye Olde Pub" dropped her bombs on target then was hit by concentrated antiaircraft fire. The damage to the Pub was horrific leaving the plane barely flvable.

In the distance, Charlie Brown saw a Bf-109 rapidly approaching to finish them off. The pilot pulled up behind the B-17 and prepared to fire. Then he took a look and could not believe what he was seeing. The bomber should not have been flying. It was shot apart. One engine had quit. Two more appeared to be malfunctioning with

one trailing smoke and the other surging erratically.

For the first time in the war, Franz Stigler decided not to shoot down an enemy. He then realized that the bomber's course would take it over the most concentrated antiaircraft artillery of Hitler's "Atlantic Wall". He pulled a hundred yards away and began to escort the bomber.

The artillery commander heard the bomber's approach and ordered his men to their guns. Through his binoculars he saw a strange sight. He saw a B-17 being escorted by a Bf-109. He knew that Germany had a few B-17s it had recovered from emergency landings or rebuilt from crashes and was using them in secret missions. The Bf-109 escort was proof to him that the bomber was German. He ordered a cease fire.

After making the coast, the German peeled off and headed for home believing that the B-17 would crash into the North Sea. The B-17 made it to England. Many years later the pilots would meet through information printed in American and German magazines. aviation Franz had managed to emigrate to Canada. The two elderly men met in Seattle in 1990. They shook hands then hugged. A few months later, CBS News asked to interview the two men as they attended a reunion of the 379th Bomb Group. After the cameras had stopped, a crowd of more than two dozen people ran to Franz, many with tears in their eyes, some crying. They were the children and grandchildren of Charlie's crew members who would not have been born had Franz not answered "A Higher Call" in 1943.

About this exhibition:

Paris Gibson Square Museum of Art invites the public to explore the visual and narrative quandaries quilted into the amazing textile artwork created by celebrated artist Maggy Rozycki mythology, hazardous waste, beauty, death, a found quilt, altered and repaired and surveillance meet whimsy, for the piece. One of the featured works, Installation, was created in 2017 using a found quilt, cotton and linen, and found and hand-stitched embroidery. "There are many visual symbols, metaphors, references to myths Installation," said Hiltner. "You will find images of reconnaissance satellites, snare traps, peacocks, and eyes, including the many eyes of the Greek giant, Argus Panoptes, to reference surveillance and loss of privacy. I use snakes to symbolize gossip."

Morningstar is a unique work of art that stands alone while

interconnecting with works on exhibit. Originally shown in context with Installation, this work also speaks to surveillance, with added lighthearted an disposition. The confusion created by the contrasting narrative and visual content in Morningstar is also relevant to the discordant messaging found in Superfun(d).

For Superfun(d), Hiltner studied the designs of historical sideshow and circus posters and read about the over 1700 historical and current Superfund sites in the United States on the EPA website and in correlating newspaper and journal articles (and kept a bibliography of this research). She chose the oddest and most terrible to feature in this piece.

Superfun(d)'s sideshow posters were created in cut and printed paper before being sent off to be printed on cloth. This process was new to the artist, but she learned and employed it to be able to feature the informative text clearly. The panels were then machine and Hiltner, hand guilted and embroidered. The oblivion, red and white tent was made from characters often used in the artist's Super(fun)d, work as guides, these were made

About Maggy Rozycki Hiltner:

Maggy Rozycki Hiltner is a fulltime studio artist and living in Red Lodge. She Montana. has a BFA from Syracuse University and was a Studio Assistant at Arrowmont School of Arts

Hiltner's and Crafts. For over 30 years now, she has been collaging found embroidery and quilts with her hand-stitched imagery, giving deception, and bemusement but these abandoned textiles new meaning and relevance. As a member of SAQA (Studio Art Quilt Associates), she has served as a Regional Representative Montana and Idaho and is currently their Regional Exhibitions Coordinator. Her work was featured at PGSMOA along with Ashley V. Blalock and Jennifer Reifsneider, in the 2021-22 exhibition Beyond Intention. She has been published and exhibited in museums and nationally galleries internationally and was a 2015 recipient of the Montana Arts Council Artist's Innovation Award.

ELECTRIC'S CONTINUE THEIR DOMINANCE IN TBL, WINNING 146-109 AGAINST VANCOUVER

he 2025 Great Falls Electrics basketball team enioved much success in their second season in The Basketball League. The young team has cruised to multiple wins against four of their five other TBL Pacific Northwest opponents. They will face the Willamette (OR) Valley Jaguars on Sunday night in Oregon.

The Electric showed their talent on the court this weekend when they topped the #2 Seattle Super Hawks by nine points (121-112) on evening in Seattle, Washington. KD Moore, the former collegiate player from East Central (Oklahoma) University and played in 2023 and 2024 for the TBL National Champion, Potawatomi (OK) Fire, reacted by scoring 33 points and former University of Montana-Western standout, Dexter Williams, Jr. led the team in rebounds with ten.

The Electric left Seattle for the 165 drive Vancouver, to Washington for their second encounter with the Volcanoes. Evergreen High School provided the venue for Saturday's showdown. Fans may recall their first meeting on March 15th in Washington, where Great Falls escaped with a three-point victory (86-83). KD Moore helped the Electric to their fourth straight win by acquiring 27 points.

KD Moore led a balanced attacked along with two assists in 13 for the Great Falls Electric as eight minutes of playing time. members of the Montana team finished in double figures as the top-ranked Electric team dominated in most areas of basketball by cruising to a 146-109 victory over the Vancouver Volcanoes.

Six different Electric players got into the scoring column in the first period. KD Moore and Lyle Hexom highlighted the scoring by pouring in 11 points apiece. Tremont Robninson-White had six points on two long distance treys. Great Falls led by 11 points 37-26 when the quarter concluded.

Davien Harris-Williams put in the first five points for Great Falls and Brandon lones also added a basket to start the second period on a 7-0 run. Gauman Boykins stopped the drought for Vancouver with his successful three point attempt to cut the deficit to 44-32 two minutes into the period. The Electric continued to rack up the points outscoring their opponents, 33-22 for the 77-54 advantage at the half.

After halftime, the Montana TBL squad put in 31 points to end the period with 108. Vancouver answered with 24 points as the visiting team's offense proved to be too much for the Volcanoes. Newcomer Mykal Jenkins scored a total of ten points on 5for-5 shooting

Both TBL teams combined for 69 points in the fourth quarter as Great Falls went to 9-0 on the season.

KD Moore chipped in 33 points with help from Davien Harris-Williams and Lyle Hexom combining for 49 points in another huge victory that keeps them firmly in first place in the TBL's West Conference Pacific Northwest standings with a 9-0 record. Vancover, who won only two of their nine contests this season, Andre McCown and Myles Warren each racked up 16 points apiece for head coach Curtis Hill's squad.

Both squads will meet up in Great Falls, Montana on April 11-12 at Great Falls High's Swarthout Fieldhouse starting at 7:00PM (MST) both nights in their final head-to-head meetings of the regular season.

Obituary of Philip Eve

Philip Joseph Eve - March 1, 1935 -April 3, 2025

Our beloved Philip Joseph Eve passed into the presence of the Lord on April 3, 2025. He went peacefully from his home in Great Falls, Montana, at the age of 90.

He was born on March 1, 1935, in Belt, Montana, to Joseph W. and Lorena (Casper) Eve. He was the fourth out of their ten children. His dad, IW, was the band director for various rural schools in Montana. He knew how to enjoy life, and he Geraldine, and Poplar while growing up. He graduated high school from Poplar where he excelled in sports, especially basketball. In 1955, he attended Gonzaga University in Spokane, Washington. He was a walk-on for the Gonzaga varsity basketball team and naturally a lifelong 'Zags' fan. He transferred to the college of Great Falls in Montana and met his sweetheart, LeLawne Mae "Lonnie" Gratton. They married in 1956 and started their family of seven children. 


